

USAGE OF 'TOO'



USAGE OF 'TOO'



1. The adverb **'too'** is used to show undesirable extremes.
It has a negative meaning.

- She is **too** fat.
- He is **too** tired.

2. An infinitive structure is often used after **too + adjective/adverb/determiner.**

- He is **too** tired to work.
- It is **too** hot to go outside.

USAGE OF 'TOO'



3. Expressions used to modify comparative adjectives can also be used with **'too'**.

- It happened a bit **too** soon.
- She appeared a little **too** confident.

4. We do not normally use **'too'** before an adjective followed by a noun.

- I could not lift the **too** heavy bag.
- I could not lift the bag because it was **too** heavy.

USAGE OF 'VERY and MUCH'



VERY

1. 'Very' is used with the positive degree

- Anil is **very** intelligent.

2. If **'very'** is used, it should be kept after 'the' and before the superlative degree.

- Raghav is the **very best** man in the society.

MUCH

'much' with the comparative degree:

- Anil is **much** more intelligent than Arvind.

When **'much'** is used with the superlative degree, It should be used before **'the'**

- Raghav is **much the best** man in the society.

USAGE OF 'Too much and Much too'



TOO MUCH

TOO MUCH + uncountable noun
an excessive quantity

Ex:

- There has been too much rain and the lakes are very high
- Surprisingly, there wasn't much traffic when we arrived.

MUCH TOO

MUCH TOO + ADJECTIVE

Ex:

- This car is much too expensive for me to buy.
- This case is much too heavy, you can't carry it!

USAGE OF ENOUGH





1. **Enough** with adjectives and adverbs

Position in a sentence: after an adjective or an adverb

- Your work isn't good **enough** for our company.

2. **Enough** with nouns

Position in a sentence: before a noun

- There aren't **enough** tomatoes in the fridge.



3. **Enough** without a noun

We can also use Enough **without a noun**:

- That's **enough!** Turn of the TV!

Enough is enough!

4. **Enough of**

We use **Enough of** only when there is a determiner (this/that, an article, his/her/my, etc.)

- I haven't done **enough of** the research to be able to tell the results.
