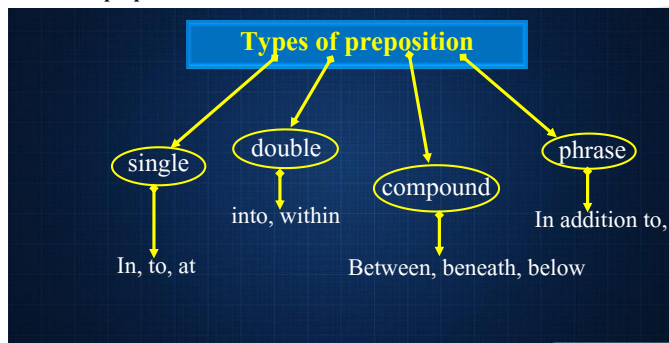

PREPOSITION

- He is writing ----- a pen.
- He jumped ----- the well.

- A word that is placed before a noun or a pronoun to establish its relation with the other noun or subject of the sentence, is called a preposition.



1. As a child, I was too afraid to go into/in to the haunted house.
2. If your battery is running low, you'll need to plug your power cord into/in to the socket.
3. After a long night, she crawled into/in her bed to go to sleep.
4. He threw the note in/into the fire.
5. Don't play in/into the sun.

In / Into

IN - It is used when an action or movement is done inside of somewhere.

INTO - It is used when action or movement is done from outside to inside to somewhere.

1. The cut off of English in IBPS PO MAINS will not be on/over/above 6 as the paper was tough enough.
2. The water level reached on/over/above my knee during the rain.
3. The birds were flying on/over/above the surface of the lake.
4. You have to be over/above 18 to watch this movie.
5. This town is 1000 metres over/above the sea level.
6. The people in the flat over/above are always arguing.
7. The birds are sitting on/over/above the branches of a tree.

over

movement - The clouds moved over the city.

Numbers - Over 100 people came to the party.

Cover - Put a hand over your mouth when you cough.

Prefix - Overweight, overrule, override, overestimate

above

higher- higher in relation to something else (on same plane) - put the painting above the fireplace.

Reference point - His parents were very happy as his performance was above expectation.

on

Touching/ surface - put the book on the table.

On top of - put those books on top of the other books on the table.

Under

Lower level / layer (spatial) - I put on a t-shirt under my jacket.

Cover - the cat was sleeping under the blanket.

The whole village was under water.

In a situation/condition - he is under a lot of pressure.

Numbers (age, quantity) - all under-sixteen matches will be played in Chennai.

Prefix - underweight, underestimate, underground, undermine

below

levels on the same plane/surface - the apartment below us is more beautiful.

Not directly under another - the dead body could be found below the surface of the water.

Reference point - below average, below standard, below expectation

beneath

touching, surface - beneath the sea, beneath the shirt

Masked emotions, thoughts - There is a sad person beneath that happy face.

Level/status - beneath dignity, beneath disgusting,

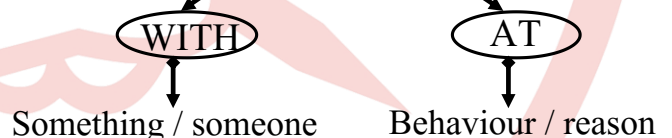
1. He is good at/in football.

GOOD



1. I felt angry at/with the way each one behaved in certain situations.
2. You can't be angry at/with the dead.
3. I was not so much angry with/at her as at what she had done.

ANGRY



1. I didn't want to part with/from my old boots.
2. The king was too greedy to part with/from his wealth.
3. She has to part from/with her mother after her transfer.
