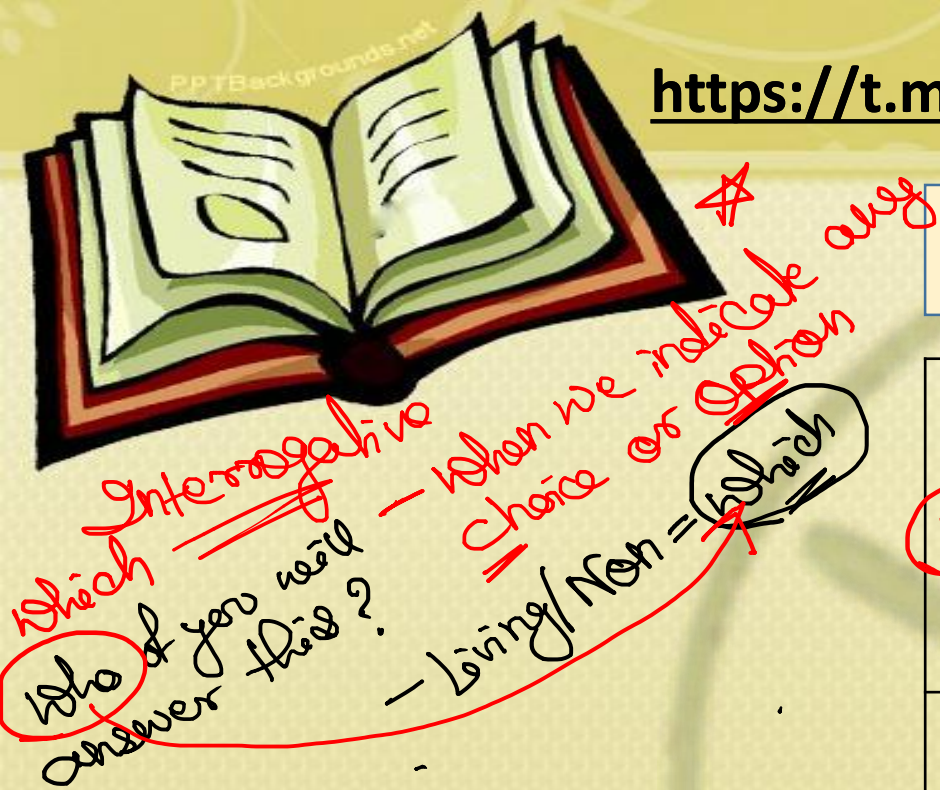

RELATIVE PRONOUN

✓ who	people and sometimes pet animals <i>who are you? Int</i> <i>The person (who) did this is my friend</i>	defining and non-defining
✓ which	animals and things <i>The bird which has</i> <i>---</i>	defining and non-defining; clause referring to a whole sentence
✓ that	people, animals and things; informal <i>He is such a person that can help everyone</i>	defining only

✓✓ **DISTRIBUTIVE PRONOUN**

→ one by one

- ❑ The pronoun that describes members of a group separately and not collectively. It refers to person or thing.
- ❑ This pronoun is always singular and we use it with (singular noun) and verb. ✓ (Note)
- ❑ We use this pronoun to describe all the members of the particular group.

INDEFINITE PRONOUN

(as a whole)

- Indefinite pronouns are those that are not specific, exact or definite.
- They are also used when the noun is unknown.
- There is a particular group of indefinite pronouns formed with a quantifier or distributive preceded by **any, some, every and no.**

A. Peter and David hate ^{each other} ~~one another~~.

B. ^{more than 2 Sub} All teams played hard against one another.

Use of 'Each Other': 'Each other' is used in the sentence when there is need to show (two people / objects) are there.

Use of 'One Another': 'One another' is used in the sentence when there is need to show more than two people / objects are there.
